As you will have noticed as you drive past the Enmore Park Golf Club there are new signs showing that the Somerset Wildlife Trust have awarded Enmore Village with the very first of the county's Wilder Garden Awards. Enough individual residents applied on line for their own gardens to be awarded a small plaque to display stating "This is a Wildlife Garden" to enable the village as a whole to receive this prestigious award.

As the two villages work closely together on the Wilder Initiative, Goathurst are now determined to get their own award. In order to do that it needs quite a few more Goathurst residents to apply, then we would have the two adjoining Wilder Parish Communities! More Enmore residents also welcome.

We are so lucky living in the countryside as our own gardens are often already managed to look out for Nature. The application questionnaire is very simple and only takes 5 or 10 minutes to complete as we have found, so please copy the following link into your browser, just tick the boxes and supply your name and address and press 'submit' at the end.

Here is a sample of questions to show you how simple it is – just tick boxes that apply to your garden:

Section 2: FOOD

- ☐ Bird feeders - e.g. seeds, nuts and fat balls.
- ☐ Nectar rich flowers (not "double flowered")
- ☐ Shrubs and trees with nuts and berries
- ☐ Flowers, fruit and seeds available throughout the year
- ☐ Night opening/scented flowers for moth and other insects (and bats)
- ☐ Encourage insects by including a wildlife pond,
- ☐ leaving areas of winter shelter and avoiding chemical

Local and Regional Weather Report

January brings us a new year, but be careful not to wash, to trim your nails or sweep your house on New Year's Day as this brings bad luck. This is also the start of the wassailing season when you put toast in the apple trees, fire your shotgun through the oldest tree and drink your best cider, all tributes to the goddess of fruit Pomona. "If the sun shines before twelve o'clock on Old Christmas Day (January 6th) there will be an abundance of

apple blossom and fruit during the year" and "if the sun shines through the apple trees on that day it will be a good cider year". "If the sun shines on St. Paul's day (Jan 25th), it betokens a good year; if rain or snow, an indifferent year; if misty it predicts a bad harvest and if thunder, great winds and much sickness". Fine weather in January is not considered a good omen for the rest of the year "If January weather be summerly gay, then wintry weather till the end of May" and "If in January the sun appear, Then March and April will pay full dear".

November started warm and wet with storm Claudia, but ended with low temperatures and some heavy frosts. Nearly 9 days out of 10 days saw cloudy weather or rain and only 5 days out of 10 saw sunny or partly sunny weather. Rainfall: Local 136 mm, Regional 123.5 mm = +2% of normal
Minimum temperatures: Local -1 deg, Regional 8.5 deg = +1.3 deg
Maximum Temperatures: Local 16 deg, Regional 14.2 deg = +0.5 deg

What are the weather forecasts for January? At the time of writing forecasts for January are likely to be of low accuracy. Met Office says more settled than December at the start of the month and continuing dry and cold, with a good chance of fogs and frosts. No long term forecast for January is available. Can we add any more from the weather lore forecast? The New Moon is on 20th December, which is before Christmas Day, so the winter will be hard. Jet Stream forecast at the start of January is not available yet.

A New Year at Secret World

**From Peter, Fundraising Manager
Secret World**

January always feels like a gentle reset after the rush of Christmas. While many people are easing back into their usual routines, things at Secret World stay busy throughout the winter. The animals still need feeding, cleaning, and warmth, and our dedicated staff and volunteers continue caring for them every single day.

Even though my own work focuses on fundraising rather than animal care, I see the impact of that effort all around the site. Hedgehogs being monitored in warm nest boxes, birds recovering quietly in our aviaries, or foxes settling into outdoor pens - these small, steady steps remind me how important it is that we're here for wildlife all year round. Our team never misses a beat, even when frost settles on the fields and the days feel short.

January can be a challenging month for wildlife. Cold weather, frozen ground, and darker evenings mean we still receive calls about animals struggling or injured. Our Reception remains open from 6am to midnight, and the phones rarely stay quiet for long - nature doesn't pay much attention to the calendar.



Behind the scenes, we're also preparing for the months ahead. Spring arrives sooner than most people expect, and with it the first orphaned and injured youngsters of the year. These winter weeks are spent repairing enclosures, stocking up on supplies, and making sure we're ready for whatever comes next.

I'd like to say a heartfelt thank you to everyone who supported us over Christmas. Winter is an expensive time for a wildlife rescue centre, and your kindness genuinely helps keep the animals warm, fed, and safe. If you'd like to help this January, here are a few simple ways:

- **Put out fresh water** for garden wildlife, especially during frosts.
- **Drive carefully** on dark mornings and evenings.
- **Leave a quiet corner of your garden undisturbed**, giving wildlife a safe place to shelter.
- And if you're able, **support Secret World** through donations, adoptions, or volunteering—we're always grateful.

As we begin a new year, I'm constantly reminded how much we rely on our community. Thank you for standing with us and helping give injured and orphaned animals a second chance.



New website for the Quantock Views Project.

A volunteer led photo archive project on the Quantock Hills has been given a new lease of life with the launch of a new website. The Quantock Views project was initiated and led by Keith Edwards, a volunteer with the National Landscape Team, in 2017 and since that time

over 1,000 historic images of the Quantock Hills, its communities and landscapes, have been captured.

The project was set up to capture existing collections of photographs, postcards and paintings which are rarely seen and to gather together private collections and recollections, which may be in danger of being lost to the Quantock community.

Iain Porter, Manager of the Quantock Hills National Landscape Team, said 'It is great to see this volunteer led project with its new website, allowing people to explore the archive and see the Quantock Hills as it was 100 years ago. Completing this new website coincides with our Management Plan review and it has been great to see the historic changes across the Quantock Hills as we plan for the future.

Walk 100 Miles With Your Dog

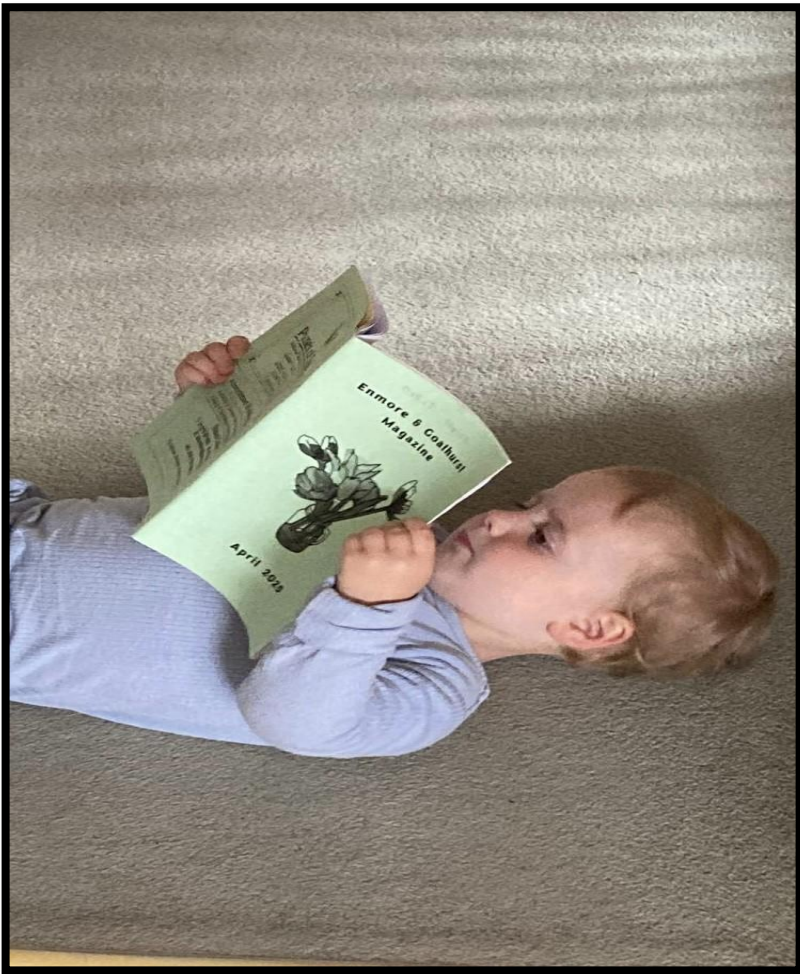
